## 20 HOUR RESPONSIBLE ADULT COURSE

This course was developed to meet the requirements for 20 hours of training for "Responsible Adult" as stipulated by Child Care Licensing Regulation. Through interactive sessions, it covers basic concepts about child development from birth to 12 years of age, child guidance, health, safety, nutrition and programming. Participants must be at least 19 years old to register, **attend all sessions** (there is not an option to make up missed classes), and pass all open book quizzes with a satisfactory mark in order to receive a certificate of completion. The workbook is included in the course fee. This is a non-credit course (cannot be applied towards the completion of a degree).

**Presenter:** Sharon Crowley is an instructor of Early Childhood Education with Delta Continuing Education. She teaches Early Childhood courses as well as coordinates the Delta ECE Diploma program. Sharon is a mother and grandmother with a passion for working with children and families.

How do you include children's thoughts, interests and ideas into your program planning? Discover strategies for incorporating emergent curriculum opportunities into your daily practice. Discover how to use observation, documentation and the Early Learning Framework to assist educators in providing engaging, reflective learning experiences for children and families.

### **Setting Up ECE Environments for Success**

Inspiration comes in many forms. Discover how to offer opportunities for children and families to explore your learning environment. How can we as educators bring nature into our spaces, include recyclable materials in our room set up, create everything from quiet areas that support emotional development to messy sensory fun? Have you ever tried putting together a construction zone for large motor play? We will also discuss evaluating your program and potential changes that could be made to layouts, as well as recognizing the important role documentation plays in ECE programs.

## EMERGENCY CHILD CARE FIRST AID/CPR LEVEL B

This 8-hour course includes obstructed airway procedures, breathing emergencies and CPR for babies, children and youth. The course also includes basic first aid for common injuries such as bleeding, burns, falls, fractures, poisons and some medical conditions etc. There is also a section on child safety. The Emergency Child Care First Aid course is recommended for child care workers and anyone living with children. This course also includes certification in Automated External Defibrillation (AED) use.

**Instructor:** Karen Clark as the owner and operator of The Vital Link, has been teaching Red Cross First Aid and CPR courses for over 20 years. She has taught locally, provincially, nationally and internationally. Karen's background and certification in ECE has made her very sought after in this field.

## WHOSE RISK IS IT ANYWAY? EXPLORING RISK WITH INFANTS AND TODDLERS

All children come into this world and are born unique, they all have unique temperaments and personalities. Thus, for some children, taking risks comes more naturally than for others. Understanding the benefits of allowing children to make choices with risk allows us to better understand and support our children and their growth and development. Risk is inevitable, and without risk-taking opportunities, our children will be more apt to take impulsive and poor risks. Participants will be asked to explore their feelings around risk, and what it means for infant toddler development. We will challenge common ideas and rules, and the problems that occur when we make decisions for children based on what we are comfortable with, rather than what they need. We will explore how we as educators have a powerful impact on what is possible for children.

**Presenter:** Jacqueline Ewonus is currently the Program Director at SFU Childcare Society in Burnaby, BC, where she oversees 7 Infant/Toddler programs. She has a longstanding relationship in the childcare field in different capacities spanning over 29 years, including work as a Licensing Officer in Vancouver. She has been an instructor with the Burnaby School District for the past 11 years, teaching in the Early Care and Education Post Basic Program's Inclusive Practice and Administration. ## PSYCHOLOGICAL FIRST AID - CANCELLED

This two-hour workshop will introduce the principles of the World Health Organisation, (WHO) model for Psychological First Aid (PFA). Participants will have an opportunity to discuss and apply tips and tools for helping people responsibly in the aftermath emergencies, disasters or critical incidents. Developing skills to approach safely, listen and link children and adults in crisis to effective supports and resources are the main objectives of learning PFA. "When terrible things happen, we want to reach out a helping hand to those who have been affected. Psychological First Aid is a humane, supportive and practical response to people suffering exposure to serious stressors and who may need support. It is an approach to help people recover by responding to their basic needs.

**Presenter:** Carolyn Sinclair is President of Strategic Business Risks International Inc. (SBRI) who deliver investigation, emergency management and educational solutions to public and private organizations and institutions. She has developed and customized personal safety & preparedness training for first responders, school districts and private agency emergency response teams.
