IN PERSON COVID-19 PRECAUTIONS

What to expect when you arrive

- Before admittance to class a self-assessment questionnaire will be done with a CCRR staff member.
- All participants/instructors must sanitize their hands upon entry to the building.

When we chose to empathize with somebody, we make a vulnerable choice, because we have to connect with something in ourselves that knows that feeling. When we choose to empathize with the children we work with, we choose to help them communicate the feelings they are feeling but cannot name. Puppets can help us by supporting our children in expressing feelings that otherwise might keep dormant or suppress. Puppets can put a smile on a child's face. Puppets help adults become silly, be a child again, and explore the unknown. Making a puppet can help adults de-stress and become creative.

CREATING A HEALTHY OUTLOOK AS AN EDUCATOR



LITTLE FOOD EXPLORERS

Little Food Explorers provides a guided exploration of four foods (beans, apples, oats, and milk) through a program guide, recipes, picture books, and parent resources. Participants will receive a lifetime supply of the program materials. Participation in this 1.5-hour nutrition workshop will provide educators with strategies to help toddlers and preschoolers develop positive feelings about food and eating, experiential activities to help introduce toddlers and preschoolers to foods, a summary of the feeding responsibility of parents and caregivers, a certificate of attendance.

INVITATIONS FOR LEARNING: SPACE, OBJECTS AND MATERIALS

Setting up meaningful invitations, that are both aesthetically pleasing and rich in sensorial potential, have the capacity to facilitate natural curiosity, critical thinking and learning processes. Through daily proposals of engaging and relevant materials, children can expand on the learning capacities as well as deepen their understanding of the world around them. Driven by exploration and inquiry, these sessions will guide the participants as to how to view the materials at hand, what are the different ways of inviting children through the use of materials, and how to extend on the given responses and possibilities.

Objectives:

- Understand the materials as 'tools for thinking'.
- Introduce the guiding principles of aesthetics and what to keep in mind when choosing and setting up the materials.
- Explore how to create a fluid arrangement of materials that will not only effectively engage children but also deepen their understanding of the materials at hand and the learning concepts.
- Discuss how to extend on the proposed invitations with the focus on 'shifting' rather than changing materials.

Presenter: Ana Vojnovic works as an educator (UBC Child Care), artist design researcher and a lecturer. Her pedagogical and creative practices are an integrated interdisciplinary response to basic questions of how built/designed environments affect and condition human perception, communication, learning, and socialization.

HELPING YOUNG CHILDREN WITH ANXIETY AND EMOTIONAL REGULATION: BUILDING YOUR TOOLKIT

FEARS AND WORRIES

All children feel anxious at times. Preschoolers are often frightened of strangers, imagery creatures or the dark. Many school-age children worry about school performance, or illness. An important part of a child's growth involves learning how to cope with common fears of childhood. Caregivers, including ECE teachers can play a crucial role in helping children develop skills for managing feelings and coping with fear and anxiety. For children to learn to manage these feelings effectively, they need adult support and guidance. Strong relationships with children build resilience and coping strategies.



Tantrums can include various aggressive behaviours including hitting, biting, irritability, impatience, self-harming, acting mean or rude. These actions are deeply rooted in instinct and emotion and are often resistant to conventional discipline practices.
